

# MINOR PROPHET MAJOR PRAYERS



**SUMMARY** | Like us, Habakkuk wrestled with God in prayer. He questioned God’s silence and doubted God’s wisdom. When God withheld what Habakkuk wanted, Habakkuk negotiated for a partial settlement. When God said no, Habakkuk satisfied himself with what God wanted to give—Himself. Focusing on God’s character realigned Habakkuk’s prayers and instilled the prophet with great confidence. The book of Habakkuk reveals some major prayers from a minor prophet that can help us as well.

## This Week’s Discussion Questions

1. Why doesn’t God answer prayer? Some suggest that Habakkuk’s book is similar to an entry in a private journal that laid bare how he wrestled with God in prayer. But it also illustrates Israel’s—and our own—wrestling with God. Read Habakkuk 1:1-4. Can you be honest enough to admit why you struggle with God in prayer?
2. Read Habakkuk 1:2-11. One approach Habakkuk uses in prayer is that he prays in advocacy for the people of Israel against the evil Babylonians. Who might you pray for in advocacy today?
3. Several decades ago, author Catherine Marshall wrote, “Prayers, like eggs, don’t hatch as soon as we lay them.” Read Habakkuk 2:1-3. What role does waiting play in prayer?
4. The Hebrew word for prayer actually means “cutting flesh.” How does Habakkuk pray with an honesty that is “cutting flesh” in Habakkuk 3:1-16? How can we follow this example?
5. Read Habakkuk 3:1-19. How have you been praying, like Habakkuk, with no evidence of God answering? How can you pray with confidence in this specific matter?

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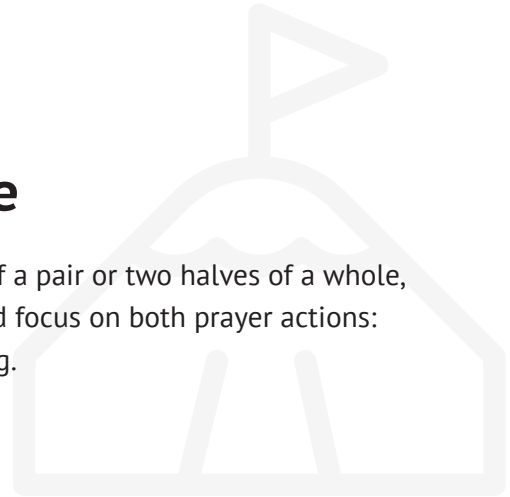
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## Challenge
