5. How might our Western/individualist perceptions of kinship, patronage, and brokerage influence our reading of the Bible?

Challenge





WHAT GOES WITHOUT BEING SAID

SUMMARY | In week 1 of our series “What Goes Without Being Said,” author, biblical scholar, and missionary practitioner Randy Richards helped us see that the Bible was written within an Eastern collectivist culture and how easy it is to miss or misinterpret important scriptural elements when you’re not part of that culture.

In week 2, we explore three more concepts—honor, shame, and boundaries—that were and are part of the Mediterranean world. Discover how stripping away our individualist assumptions about those concepts can help us read the Bible better.

This Week’s Discussion Questions


1. What Western/individualist values are taught by each of these stories: the boy who cried wolf; the tortoise and the hare; the little red hen; Cinderella. What Eastern/collectivist value is a common thread in most biblical stories?
2. Randy states that “all public questions in the New Testament are ‘honor contests.’” Read the following passages (Mark 10:1–10; Luke 10:25–37; 20:1–8, John 3:1–21). Which were honor contests? Which were not?
3. Why do you think Randy warns us in the West of the danger of using shame in our interactions with others? Could shame ever be used properly?
4. How does the biblical use of boundaries often differ from our view of boundaries?


Commit To Memory
