SUMMARY | Think about the hymn “Holy, Holy, Holy,” which calls God’s people to worship and communion with the God who is both accessible and mysterious. The first verse ends with these words: “God in three Persons, blessed Trinity.”

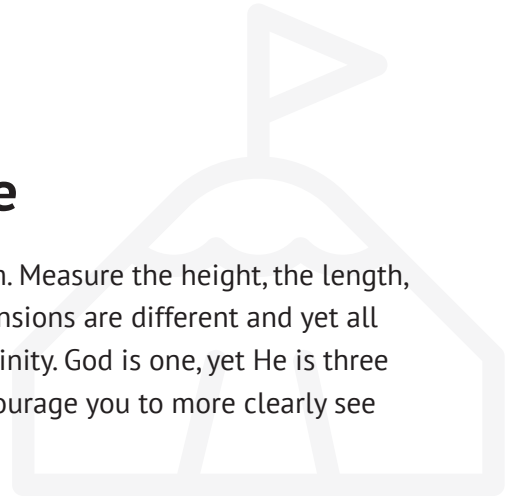
Talk about mystery! The one God who manifests Himself in three distinct persons is beyond our description and beyond our comprehension, yet this is the God who has invited us into relationship with Him. On *Discover the Word*, we want to explore some Scriptures that display this three-in-one concept and see what they tell us about our great God.

This Week’s Discussion Questions

1. What are some ways you’ve heard people try to explain the Trinity? How were those explanations helpful? How were they inadequate?
2. Read [1 Peter 1:1–2](#). How are the members of the Godhead described as participating in our salvation? Which of the Godhead seems most mysterious? Which is the most accessible? Why?
3. Read [Ephesians 4:4–6](#). How do we see the life of the three-in-one God intertwined with the life of the church? How is this intertwining an encouragement to us?
4. [Second Corinthians 13:14](#) is one of the great benedictions in the Bible. How is each member of the Trinity a source of blessing?

Challenge

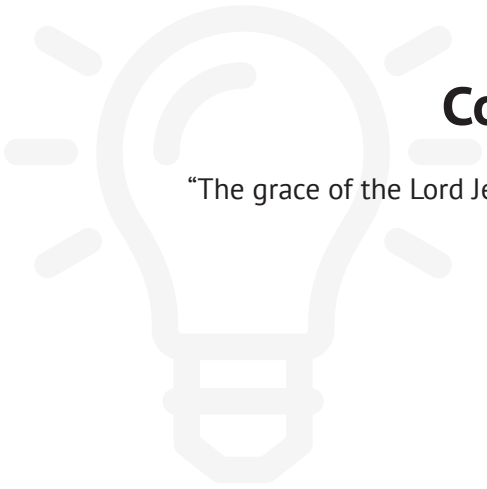
